About Asbury Woods

The mission of Asbury Woods is to inspire a greater connection to the natural world by protecting, managing, and interpreting our property; providing outdoor recreational opportunities; and offering environmental education experiences.

Asbury Woods achieves this mission through a diverse array of educational, environmental, and recreational programming for schools, community groups, families, and individuals of all ages. In addition, Asbury Woods manages and maintains 234 acres of preserved property, which includes native species, old-growth forests, landscaped gardens, wetlands, boardwalk trails, and dirt trails. The Andrew J. Conner Nature Center at Asbury Woods is the cornerstone of educational programming, providing animal exhibits and free public access. The Brown's Farm Barn, located on Sterrettania Road, provides additional programming space for summer camps, school visits, and community programs.

Asbury Woods is an independent, non-profit organization whose mission is made possible by funding from program and service fees, grants, special events, and generous donations from members and patrons. Annually, Asbury Woods positively impacts thousands of people who use the trails, attend festivals, or participate in education and community outreach programs.



Environmental Education Focus

Overview

Interns in this track will assist in planning, preparing, and delivering environmental education programs for audiences of all ages. They will help lead camps, school programs, and public events while learning best practices in interpretation and education.

Example Projects & Experiences

- Assist with leading summer camps and school field trips
- Create educational materials or props for nature lessons
- Develop and lead a short program on a topic of interest (e.g., pollinators, watersheds)
- Shadow educators and receive feedback
- Participate in outreach events or family programs

Interns in this track will focus on land stewardship, habitat restoration, and sustainable practices at Asbury Woods. They will gain hands-on field experience and contribute to meaningful conservation efforts on the property.

Example Projects & Experiences

- Assist with invasive species removal and native planting
- Trail maintenance and erosion prevention projects
- Water quality or wildlife monitoring (amphibians, pollinators, etc.)
- Help implement conservation practices such as rain gardens or habitat shelters
- Create signage or reports on conservation work

Animal Care Focus

Overview

Interns in this track will support the care, feeding, enrichment, and handling of the education animals at Asbury Woods. This includes reptiles, amphibians, and small mammals used in public programs.

Example Projects & Experiences

- Daily husbandry: feeding, cleaning, health monitoring
- Enrichment design and implementation
- Assist in animal encounters during programs
- Create informational signage for animal exhibits
- Shadow animal care staff and learn handling protocols

- Animal behavior observation and documentation
- Responsible animal handling and safety
- Educational interpretation with live animals
- Record-keeping and cleanliness standards

🔗 Application Tips & Program Bundling Ideas

Interns can choose one primary focus area, but they are encouraged to explore overlapping interests. Staff may also offer hybrid experiences when appropriate. Here are some ways to customize the experience:

Examples of Bundling Focus Areas

- Education + Animal Care: Interns lead live animal programs for the public or schools. Interns may also help or create their own public program featuring the animals of Pennsylvania and Asbury Woods.
- Conservation + Education: Interns develop and teach programs about native species or restoration efforts. Interns help with trail maintenance and work with volunteers on why this project matters.
- Animal Care + Conservation: Interns assist in creating enrichment that mimics natural behaviors or habitats.

Tips for Applicants

- Review all three focus areas before applying.
- Reflect on your academic and career goals to select a focus.
- In your application, describe why you're drawn to that focus and any relevant experience.
- Be open to learning from all departments — interdisciplinary knowledge is valuable!
